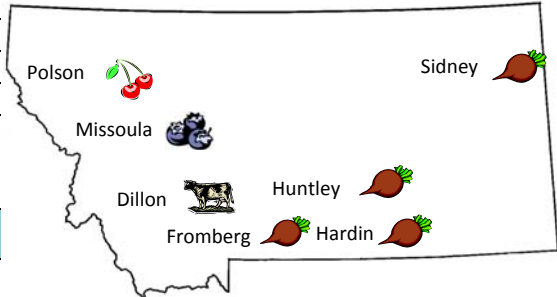

Huntley's special junior high project was career exploration. Weekly field trips explored careers in aviation, engineering, higher education, and health sciences.

June 11 to July 20	Classes delivered in the home to students and families for 4 hours a day using the Math Plus in-home curriculum.		
Missoula			
June 18 to July 20	Operates a day school from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.		
Summer project	Silk screening. Students put their own artwork on traditional silk scarves while learning the mathematics of proportions.		
Summer theme	Missoula wildlife. Students went on weekly nature walks to learn about local plants and animals, and get inspiration for writing and artwork.		
Polson			
July 16 to August 3	Operates a day school from 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Operates evening and weekend tutorial projects in the camps from 3:00 to 9:00 p.m.		
July 22	Math fiesta. Over 350 students and parents learned math through games that can be played with household objects.		
July 25	School parent night. Parents and students learned reading activities and watched their students perform songs and skits.		



Families in Fromberg and Sidney typically travel from Texas to Montana in the summer to hoe and thin sugar beet fields. Elementary students attend day school. Night school is provided for high school students who work during the day.

Children in Huntley are primarily based in Montana and move in the summer and fall to obtain agricultural work related to sugar beet production.

Migrant children in Missoula are typically from Hmong or Russian families who pick wild crops such as huckleberries and morel mushrooms.

Migrant families in Polson travel from Washington to Montana in mid-July for the short, but intense, cherry harvest.

*Summer Success: Reading and Math is a Great Source curriculum adopted by the Curriculum Committee in 2003. It is specifically designed for summer programs and English language learners.

**Math Plus is curriculum developed for the Department of Education, Office of Migrant Education incentive grant. Based on the principals of Sheltered Instruction, Cognitively Guided Instruction and Balanced Literacy, the curriculum helps students increase their math skills and confidence in their math abilities.
